A sister, 77 years old, was brought directly from the hospital (in her hospital attire) and claims to have been perfectly healed when prayed for. She had been given up by five doctors.

Mrs. Rosa Lopez, a Mexican preacher's wife, who had been afflicted for seven years with a stone tumor, was healed. During the past four years she had suffer-

ed, and she turned in bed for the first time. When she found that she could turn, she turned over in bed six times. She can now eat with knife and fork and dress herself and lift her arms. The day she was prayed for she took some steps alone for the first time, and she says she is daily rapidly improving.

Mrs. Parker of this city (Los Angeles) was prayed for and healed of a tumor, which later passed away and weighed 3-4 of a pound. Her little daughter, five years old, was prayed for and healed of epilepsy. She had been having from two to five spasms a day. The mother says there is a remarkable change in the child.

It is reported that a good spirit has been manifested all through the meeting. The big, long altar is daily filled with seekers and many break through to God getting saved, healed and baptized in the

That night Brother Reese went home and went to bed. He was awakened by hearing a voice and opened his eyes and saw two angels standing by his bed. A light filled the room as the angels were bright and shone like the sun. They had long golden hair and beautiful wings and each carried a golden palm. Even their feet, finger nails and toe nails were all shining with the same brightness, and their feet never touched the floor, but they stood on a level with his bed. Brother Reese thought Jesus was coming sure and he tried to awaken the brother who slept with him, but he slept on.

The angel spoke to him in a tender voice of sweetness, and said in English, "Go and warn God's people to watch and pray for the time is at hand for the coming of the Lord. Tell them to warn the American people that God is preaching to Europe at the cannon's mouth because he spread his hands all day long to a rebellious people, speaking to them by the Spirit, and they would not hear. Each nation is claiming that its God is the greatest, yet in reality they are all mocking God. A man will soon conquer Europe and then God will break to this nation with the mouth of the cannon, and those who are asleep (deceived) will remain asleep, and those whose eyes are on man will remain with man, and this country will be conquered. Then Jesus will catch away his bride and God will take away His Spirit from the earth and those who are not filled with the Spirit, whose lamps are not trimmed and burning, will fall on that day. The time is at hand."

The angels then disappeared. Brother Reese said that all strength left him and he seemed so small and helpless before these ministering servants sent from God.

This is certainly a warning to come to God and to be filled with the Holy Spirit and be ready before it is too late. Truly the time is short when God will send His angels down to earth to warn the people.

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RECEIVE YE THE HOLY GHOST.

Jesus gave to the disciples a very remarkable admonition when, in the upper room, He used this expression, saying to them that they should receive the Holy Ghost: John 20:23. Another remarkable thing He said to them just in the same connection: He said "Whosoever sins ye remit they are remitted unto them and whosoever sins ye retain they are retained." These were among the last sayings of Jesus to them and doubtless they were listening intently to His words and they must have realized their importance. Jesus had explained to them, before this, the need of His going away; showing them that He was to go back to the Father to whom He had taught them to pray, saying, "Our Father." It was he of whom He spoke immediately after His resurrection as He talked with Mary saying, "Go to My brethren and say, I ascend to My Father and your Father," and since they knew He was going away and that perhaps soon, how natural for them to expect that great importance should attach to His words at the time.

His expression concerning their relation to the sins of others must have impressed them wonderfully, and possibly their eyes were open to something of what they had little, if any understanding—sins remitted and sins retained; they to judge sin and, knowing the mind of God, being able to stand with God in matters such as that! Such thought must bring to anyone a sense of responsibility and a possible shrinking from a position indicated by his words. However, Jesus gave them the key to the situation in what He said to them, and they having perfect confidence in Him, must have accepted His words.

He BREATHED upon them and said "Receive ye the Holy Ghost." Just what did He mean for them to understand by His act and His words. He breathed upon them, or as it perhaps more literally correct. He breathed hard. It seems that He omitted or exhaled His breath in a way that was especially noticeable. The act does not mean He is then and there imparting the Holy Ghost, and nothing in the true reading implies that. He breathed hard however. There must have been deep significance in His act. He would do nothing now that was not burdened with

meaning. Whatever else may be seen in this remarkable act on the part of Christ, there is doubtless this, which we may gather from the nature of the case, the word "Spirit," and the analogous term "Ghost," convey essentially the same thought or shade of meaning as the act of the Lord upon this occasion. In His breathing hard, as you or anyone may, it may have been illustrating to them more the nature of the Holy Ghost than the means of receiving Him. The Spirit of God—in what He is, but not Who He is—might well be thus explained. The Holy Ghost in His nature and essence—the what He is, but not who He is—is doubtless the breathed-forth life of God coming to them and to us a distinct manifestation, having personality and individuality of character and yet being truly the breathed-forth divine life. This may explain why Jesus gave such an illustration of what He meant when He said "Receive ye the Holy Ghost."

God had promised the pouring out of His Spirit—asserting that the result in one who should receive Him, would be a visible result, followed by an experience of close association between God and man, a new condition of affairs in the life, including things unheard of and impossible before. Jesus reaffirmed the same truth to the disciples, referring to the "Promise of the Father which ye have heard of Me." Now the time was near and Jesus, knowing what was intended for them, and knowing what it would mean to them to be left alone, as they must be, gives to them the very most important admonition for that hour "RECEIVE YE THE HOLY GHOST." Yes, the promise is now to be faithful; I am going back to the Father and He, the Father, will send the Paraclete in My name. Thus He taught them that they must be ready to receive Him when He should come to them, and not allow anything to hinder their true relationship to the Holy Ghost, the Blessed Comforter, who should abide with them forever; who should lead them, teach them, recalling to their minds all Jesus had said; who should take of His and show it unto them, and altogether be to them all things needful for them. How essential for them to understand. How surely they did understand. How wonderfully it all happened as promised. How marvelous were the conditions which developed in them. How mighty were the works which they did. How gloriously God established the truth of His promise.

Beloved, can anyone give a reason why all of Christ's disciples should not receive the Holy Ghost? Or can anyone sincerely think that we can do without His presence and power? Surely the words of Jesus in the upper room at Jerusalem on that eventful day, as He spoke to the Apostles, suggest to us the imperative need of doing as He said and as they did. There are indeed wonderful things in the Divine purpose for us all; blessed fellowship with God in the working out of His plan, together with a preparation for greater things to come, in all of which we must have God's wise provision for us, the ministry of the Holy Ghost. SUNDAY SCHOOL

November 1, 1915. AMOS THE FEARLESS PROPHET. Lesson Text—Amos. 5:1-15.

Golden Text—He that hath my word, let him speak my word faithfully. Jer. 23:28.

Leading Thought.—The need of seeking God today.

1. The sins of backslidden Israel. We must view this lesson in a general way, a close outline being hard to make. Israel's backsliding has been steady and deliberate. They are fallen as a people and the lesson opens with a mournful dirge or lamentation over their pitiable condition. vs 1-3. It rather reminds us of David's mourning over Saul and Jonathan. 2 Sam. 1:17. "How are the mighty fallen!" It is such a lamentation as might have been made for Samson when shorn of his strength after playing himself into the hands of the harlot Delilah. Judg. 16:17-21. And the same wall might ascend today for those who after once sharing God's favor have left their first love and made affinity with the world and its allurements. Ponder deeply Paul's command to Timothy "keep thyself pure." 1 Tim. 5:22; Jas. 1:27; Heb. 12:15; Rev. 3:4. Amos, with his partial contemporary Hosea, were commissioned to the Ten Tribes. Read the touch of Amos' personal life in ch. 7:10-17. He was divinely commissioned (ch. 3:8) and spoke his plain, pointed message fearlessly. He was a herald of righteousness, a missionary to the people of his own kindred, unlike Jonah whom God called to a foreign city. It took the power of the Holy Ghost and real divine courage to stand with such a message as Amos had. But God was not mistaken in his man. We need hundreds of such "fearless prophets" to call many of God's professed followers to repentance today. That you have once received the Pentecostal refreshing does in no wise free you from the possibility of needing repentance in your life. God has a "plumbline" still set in the midst of his people. Ch. 7:7, 8. Note the special sins Amos enumerates. They were full of idolatry, (v. 3) having forsaken the mighty God who had delivered and shown them mercy again and again. vs. 8. Bethel, Gilgal and Beersheba were all places where God had once met His people in a special way. So much the more dangerous and far-reaching the evil affects now connected therewith. They hated instruction (v. 10); they oppressed the poor (v. 11, 12); they were covetous and cruel. How exactly do these conditions correspond with those of today! Jas. 5:1-9; 2 Tim. 3:1-5. And will not the same righteous Lord deal in judgment with any nation who fails to stand for truth and justice and righteousness and love? Recall a little history; consider the nations that have already crumbled to dust and know for yourselves that "The Lord is his name." What a wonderful picture of God's almightiness we have in v. 8. Israel's wickedness had as a natural consequence brought weakness (vs. 1-3); and all their wretched condition was open to God's knowledge. v. 12.

2. The salvation of Israel. Now we have another view of the situation. From beholding Israel's hopeless helpless condition, we turn to hear God's gracious invitation and provision for their salvation. After telling them of their sinful state we should always point them to the "Lamb that beareth away the sins of the world." Israel could not be saved through the penance and religious forms of Gilgal and Bethel. vs. 5, 6. It was the Lord Himself whom Israel needed and four times the prophet exhorts them to "seek for Him." vs. 4, 6, 8, 14. There are promises to those who "seek" today as well as their. Deut. 4:29; 1 Chr. 28:9; Psa. 9:10; 49:32; Prov. 11:27; Jer. 29:13; Lam. 3:25; Zeph. 2:3; Luke 11:9; 17:31. But seeking of God involves a forsaking of all that displeases Him. How earnestly the Spirit of God through Amos pleads with the people to return! Seeking God is their only hope of salvation. It will avert the judgments liable to break upon them at any time (v. 6); it will assure them of life, for God is the source of life; it will bring strength (vs. 8, 9); it will bring the continual presence of the God of hosts. v. 14. It will bring a hate for the evil and a love for the good; it will mean the establishing of judgment in the gate. And above all as a climax, a heavenly tone among the minor tones of this lamentation are the final words, "It may be that the Lord God of hosts will be gracious."—ALICE R. FLOWER.

cost. 2 Pet. 1:16-18. Luke 9:28-36. The Kithiopsis confessed that Christ was the Son of God. (Acts 8:37.) This was after Pentecost.

John says that these are written that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing, ye might have life through His name. (John 20:31.) Note that the gospel record by John, and also the Epistles, both teach Jesus Christ to be the Son of God, and also that faith in Him brings eternal life.

THE NEED OF THE HOUR

The supreme thought of the hour for the baptized church is the thought of preparedness to meet her soon coming Lord. Thus far the Lord has helped us to escape His arms forever. But Jesus has not yet appeared again the second time into those of us who look for Him.

Many unbelievers of those days, such as the Pharisees, looked upon Him as the Son of David—just human. The Unitarians and others believe the same today, and have a great following.

Much depends upon this question, "What think ye of Christ?" Yes, the destiny of every soul depends upon this question. There had been many sons born into the world, but no one ever laid claim to a birth like Christ's.

Matt. 1:11 says, "His name shall be called Jesus, for He shall save His people from their sins." Many have learned to call Him by that name, for which we thank God.

James said the world cannot receive the Holy Ghost. (1 John 12:12.) But Jesus, the world can receive Christ, for God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believeth on Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. (John 3:16.)

He that believeth on the Son of God hath the witness in himself; he that believeth not God hath made Him a liar because he believeth not the record God gave of His Son.

He that hath the Son hath life; and he that hath not the Son of God, hath not life. (See 1 John 5:9-12.)

Reader, will you believe the record that God gave of His Son?

Now in conclusion, let us remember the following points: God had promised a Son through prophecy; the angel said He should be called the Son of God; (Luke 1:35.) John bear record when he saw the Spirit descend on Christ that He was the Son of God, God the Father, introduced His Son from Heaven at the Baptismal service saying, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased;" the apostles believed and taught that Jesus Christ was the Son of God before and after Pentecost; God declared Jesus to be the Son of God with power by the resurrection from the dead; (See Rom. 1:3, 4.)

Grace be with you, mercy, and peace from God the Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of the Father, in truth and in love. (2 John 3.)

In Him which is the head of all principality and power among other wonderful things covers the ground of two very helpful thoughts to man. One is that we are in Christ, completely, who are really accepted in Him, and the other is that we are in His completeness as one partaking of His perfection.

A line of thought which is closely related to this in my mind concerns conditions as they are and as they should be. That we, as a people may meet both God's expectation on the one hand and the opposing power of Satan on the other.

We should be one, or in agreement on every line of essential faith and practice; that there should be no factions or sects among us but holding the mystery of faith in a pure conscience (1st Tim. 3:9.) earnestly contending for the faith (or system of belief) once delivered to the saints; (Jude 3) exhorting to keep the unity of the spirit, loving one another with a pure heart fervently, considering one another to provoke unto love and good works, with openness of purpose, stand together for God and spake His Word. (1st Cor. 1:10) We may not see the improved conditions which we long for and that when Jesus comes there will not be much which is holding together, but then that does not seem right and I feel again that we who see the Bible way, must at least do our best to bring in what we see is God's will for the church.

There are some of God's people even today who do not want to call Jesus Christ the Son of God, they try to condense the Trinity to make the Lord Jesus Christ to mean the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. They even go so far as to say they have that revelation from God, but none of the Bible writers claim such.

Heb. 13:8 says, "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today, and forever." No change made—none needed.

We have given the opinion of some of the preachers of our day, and now let us see what some of the Bible witnesses have to say, and you can judge for yourself.

John the Baptist's testimony: "I saw and bear record that this is the Son of God." (St. John 1:34.) This testimony was given as an eye witness of the Spirit descending on the Messiah and God Himself, spoke from Heaven, "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased." Matt. 3:17, 17.

Let Mark testify, Mark 1:1. The beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, as it is written in the prophets, "Behold I send my messenger before thy face, which shall prepare thy way before thee." You see that Mark calls Jesus the Son of God.

Peter's testimony is, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." Christ said this was a revelation from the Father. See Matt. 16:16, 17. Peter, many years after the Pentecostal outpouring of the Spirit, writes to the strangers scattered abroad, telling them of his wonderful experience in a prayer-meeting with Christ on the Mount of Transfiguration, when God, the Father, spoke from Heaven, "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased." Peter still held to the view that Christ was the Son of God after Pentecost.

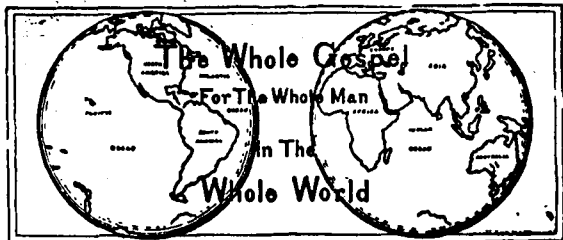

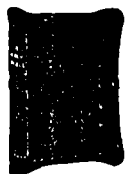
